A Journey from **Vision 2016 to Vision 2026**

Alarmed by the findings of the Justice Rajinder Sachar Committee Report that highlighted a dismal picture of the socioeconomic conditions of Muslims in India, several eminent personalities and community leaders came together in 2006 to set strategy and work to change the situation of the community. Under the leadership of Dr Abdul Haq Ansari, Vision 2016, a 10-year programme, was initiated for the development of the poor and deprived sections of the society. Providing basic amenities to improve their living condition and enable them to live a decent life was the basic goal.

The comprehensive programme covers various sectors, including Education, HealthCare, Economic Development, Women Empowerment, Social Welfare, Community Development, Disaster Management, Micro Finance and Civil rights Protection. Hundreds of nongovernmental organisations are working to implement the thousands of projects of the Vision 2016, which was extended and renamed Vision 2026 on January 1, 2017.

Human Welfare Foundation (HWF), an NGO formed in 2008, came into being exclusively to work for the initiative. This national-level NGO, formed under the chairmanship of Late Sayid Hamid IAS (Retd), is committed to go beyond charity and make the deprived people get strong enough to stand their own. Its slogan

"Creating Partnerships with the Needy" points to the spirit of the developmental goal of the Foundation.

The HWF, with several distinguished and experienced community leaders on its board of trustees, acts as an umbrella body for the implementation of programmes under Vision 2016. The Foundation initiated formation of various organisations under the leadership and guidance of its founder General Secretary Prof KA Siddique Hassan to undertake focused and specialised activities in disaster management, microfinance, medical service, etc. Few other organizations are under consideration for making focused efforts for women empowerment, village development, implementation of government schemes at grass-root level and entrepreneurial development.

With the joint efforts of its national and local level partners, the HWF implemented around 5,000 projects under with the joint effort of its national and local level partners. More than nine million people benefitted from Vision 2016. The journey continues as the programme has entered its second phase and is now called Vision 2026.



VACCINATION PROGRAM

The office of the Chief District Medical Officer (CDMO) has accepted the HWF proposal to conduct a free vaccination program once in a week at Radiance building, Abul Fazal Enclave, New Delhi. HWF has been conducting the vaccination since January 2018 under the supervision of CDMO office on every Tuesday. 275 people are the beneficiaries of this program.





MOBILE MEDICAL UNITS

Mobile Medical Units are working well at Jamshedpur, Jharkhand and Solapur, Maharashta. HWF has made an agreement with Aster DM Foundation for running a Mobile Medical Van in association with Al Shifa hospital in Delhi.



BLOOD DONATION CAMP

A blood donation camp was organized at the basement of Al Shifa Hospital in association with Rotary blood bank, Munirka, New Delhi. Around 55 donors donated their blood.



MEDICAL AID

Financial Support to Poor Patients:

SPECIAL MEDICAL AID RARE AND CRIPPLING DISEASE

Family of Aligarh

Farhan Ahmad Usamani is a resident of Aligarh, Uttar Pradesh. His three children Alqamah Usmani (13 years old), Fauzan Usmani (8 years old) and Rayyan Usmani (6 years old) are suffering from the 'Delayed Milestone Problem' since 6 months after their birth. They have been undergoing the treatment in PGI Lucknow for the last 6 years. Unfortunately, it could not make any progress in their health condition. After the results of treatment, the physicians had advised their family to look after them at home. They have discovered that no cure exists for this disease currently. HWF identified this critical case in April 2017. HWF Health Care team along with Mr. Shamsuddin (IGIB, New Delhi) have visited Aligarh and adopted the children. Their treatment was started under the supervision of Dr. Sheffali (AIIMS) and later consulted them with physiotherapy. Currently, HWF team visits them and provides medicines in every month since August 2017.

Family of Agra

Mohammad Nazir, a resident of Agra, had petitioned the government that six of his children be euthanised. Nazir and his wife Tabassum's desperate plea to terminate the lives of their children was preceded by 15 agonising years of watching six of their eight children debilitated by a malevolent disease that destroys their neurons and steadily wastes away their muscles. Human Welfare Foundation has been coordinating between the family and the CSIR- Institute of Genomics and Integrative Biology (CSIR-IGIB), which is doing research on the patients to find the reasons and an early cure to the disease. HWF also helped in rehabilitating the family and then arranging for the logistics and medical expenses at All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) and Al Shifa Hospital, New Delhi. Two of their children have started going to school. HWF Health Care team has managed the annual medical checkup of Agra family in AIIMS. The physician has given the next appointment for check up in June 2018 after one year progress. HWF has solved their issues of land.



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

No man can live alone. We always need our family, friends and the community around us, in good times and bad. Unfortunately, we often forget that community needs our help too.


DRINKING WATER

PROJECT

Water is a basic human necessity and a vital natural resource necessary for all aspects of life. Unfortunately, the fundamental right of accessing clean water has been denied to many of the poorest people in the world. Human Welfare Foundation recognizes the critical importance of the issue and focuses on the most-affected areas to tackle water crisis by providing people with sources of clean water. A total number of 150 Drinking Water Projects were completed and opened for public in eight states of the country. In these 150 projects, 73 Submersibles, 66 Hand Pumps, 10 Open Wells and 1 Reverse Osmosis System were established.

LOW COST HOSUING AID &

PUBLIC TOILETS

India is home to the largest homeless population in the world. People living, eating and sleeping on the streets is a regular site in India. Millions of poor who cannot afford to buy a roof over their head end up on the footpaths and flyovers of flourishing metros of India. HWF provides financial aid to homeless people living in the least developed villages in various North Indian states. Victims of natural calamities are given priority under the housing aid project. During 2017-2018, HWF built a total number of 59 houses in West Bengal, Assam and Bihar.

PUBLIC TOILETS: According to 2011 census, only 46.9% of the 246.6 million households have lavatories while 49.8% defecate in the open. The remaining 3.2% use public toilets. Sensing the gravity of situation, HWF has started building Public toilets in the villages with no toilets. Picture on the right is that of a recently built public toilet.



RAMADAN FOOD

PROJECT

The Human Welfare Foundation brings smiles to the faces of thousands of families during the Holy Month of Ramazan under its flagship program VISION 2026. During the year 2016, HWF distributed 37,959 Iftar Kits containing one month ration and conducted Iftar programs benefitting 24,370 in 17 states of the country to observe the month of Ramazan. The HWF also distributed 250 Eid gifts and gave Fitra and Zakat to 8,112 families.










EID-AL-ADHA CELEBRATION

WITH THE NEEDY ACROSS THE COUNTRY

The Human Welfare Foundation celebrated Eid-ul-Adha with the poor and needy people across the country. Last year, HWF distributed Udhiya Food Packets at several places such as Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Jharkhand, West Bengal, Assam, Haryana, Punjab etc. We ensure that those who receive Udhiya food aid are among the most vulnerable in their



communities, which include widows, orphans, the elderly, internally displaced persons, refugees and the poor. HWF distributed Udhiya food packets to 1,39,375 families of 21 states across the country.





REFUGEE RELIEF

PROGRAM

According to official records, more than 40,000 Rohingya refugees are living in India. Majority of them are living in a very miserable condition in Delhi, Jammu, Mewat and Hyderabad. Human Welfare Foundation along with Society for Bright Future have been working for the betterment of the Rohingya refugees with the support of Well wishers and international agencies.



FOOD DISTRIBUTION

During the month of October and November, 2017, HWF volunteers organized a Food and clothes campaign for Rohingya families. HWF collected over 20000 pair clothes and 30000 Kilogram ration and later organized a well arranged distribution of collected materials at Rohingya camps in Haryana and New Delhi.



- HWF organized 5 programs to provide 50kg ration (for small family) and 75kg ration (for big family) to all families residing in 11 refugee camps in Delhi and Faridabad and Nuh in Haryana.
- HWF conducted ration distribution program for 135 families of Kanchankunj and Shram Vihar camps in New Delhi.
- HWF, Society for Bright Future and Mallapuram Kunnummal Koottayima, Kerala jointly organized a food distribution camp for 55 Rohingya families residing in Mujedi and Mirzapur villages, Faridabad, Haryana.
- HWF Ration Distribution program in village Budhena, Faridabad and provided relief material to the 36 families.
- Society for Bright Future and Jamiyythu Ahlil Quran Val Hadees, Tamilnadu jointly organized ration distribution program at two places in Nuh, Hayana. The program covered 415 families of 5 camps of Mewat area and provided 50kg ration each for small families and 75kg ration each for big families.



CLOTH DISTRIBUTION

HWF organized well managed free cloth distribution programs at refugee camps, in which the beneficiaries had a choice to choose cloths of their comfortable size and colour.

 HWF and Society for Bright Future jointly organized a splendid clothes distribution



program at Nuh, Haryana. Almost 5000 clothes were showcased at the venue and a coupon was provided to each family to select clothes as per their needs. 1450 beneficiaries of 397 families from 5 different camps received clothes.

- HWF distributed clothes including winter clothes for 55 Rohingya families residing in Mujedi and Mirzapur villages. Shelter materials like tarpaulin/tent were also provided, for the families of fire victims in the camp to resettle their huts.
- HWF organized Cloth Distribution program in village Budhena and provided relief materials to the 36 families according to the family size.
- HWF organized a cloth distribution program for 1194 beneficiaries after conducting a survey with the help of interns from Al Falah University and IGNOU in Shram Vihar area in Delhi.
- Cloths were distributed in kanchankunj camp for 56 families of Rohingya Refugees with the help of interns from Symbiosis University.







DECENT SHELTER

PROJECT

HWF introduced its new project for Rohingya families in Hyderabad to establish a gated colony under the title 'Decent Shelter Project'. The project has been started in one acre land and it will be beneficial for over 100 families. On 31st January 2018, HWF conducted a Handover Ceremony of 106 houses for Houseless Rohingya families...













SCHOOL BAG DISTRIBUTION

HWF distributed 50 school bags and other education appliances for students among Rohingya refugees. HWF provided 30 students residing in Madrasa in Nuh, Mewat, Haryana with bedding assistance.



MARRIAGE ASSISTANCE

MASS MARRIAGE PROGRAM

Human Welfare Foundation provides a platform to families with financially weak background to find spouse for their daughters and marry them. Last year, a mass marriage program was organised at Suitala Village, Murshidabad in West Bengal. A total number of 16 couples tied knots at the event. At this occasion, dress, kitchen utensils, sewing machine and financial help were gifted to each couple. Hundreds of people attended the event organized by HWF. In total, 16 couples received HWF support during the year 2017-2018.







ORPHAN CARE

Orphaned children are among the most vulnerable in society. They are often left in the care of elderly relatives who do not have the ability to support them and often consequently receive no education and are driven into work at a very early age missing out on a real childhood and education. This obviously affects them for the rest of their lives and they are not able to develop into respectable members of society.

Human Welfare Foundation's Orphan Care Programme is designed to address the needs of the orphans and improve their lives in a way that respects and preserves the customs and traditions of the communities in which they reside. Through Orphan Care Program we not only assist orphans and needy children, but also benefits the communities in which they live.


Our scheme runs in northen and eastern states of India and we sponsor children of all faiths, gender, ages and abilities. Our local partners keep an eye on the progress of these children and make sure that they are getting the best possible care.

Under the Orphan Care Programme, we support construction and maintenance of Orphanages as well as disbursing monthly financial support to orphan children living with their families and relative. 2,095 orphans are receiving monthly financial assistance under the Orphan Care Program.

WORLD ORPHAN DAY

World Orphan Day has been observed on 15th Ramadhan at many palces across the country. In Telengana and Andhra Pradesh, OCD arranged 4 programs, in which around 320 Orphans were participated. In Gujarat 130 orphans attended and 50 Orphans were participated in each programs held in Bihar, Goa and West Bengal.





ORPHAN SCHOLARSHIP DISTRIBUTION PROGRAMS

Orphan Care Department arranged Orphan Scholarship distribution programs at the level of agencies and individuals in ten states across India. A total number of 548 scholaships were distributed under the sponsorship of agencies such as IHH, HAI, ICNA and Qatar Foundation. At individual level around 726 orphans have received scholarships.









RARGAON CHILDREN'S HOME CONSTRUCTION COMPLETED

The construction work of a new orphanage at Rargaon in Jharkhand was completed. This orphanage has the capacity to accommodate 50 orphans.

ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

India is the fastest growing large economy in the world today. Despite this, one in every five Indians is poor. 22 percent of the population or 270 million people are living below the poverty line.

Muslims, the largest minority who make up 14.2% of India's 1.25-billion population, come out pretty much at the bottom of most socio-economic indices, even a decade after a high-level government probe into their historical disadvantages led to policy actions. Almost a quarter of India's 370,000 beggars are Muslims, newly released data from the 2011 Census show, reinforcing that the community still lags on most counts despite the country's rapid economic growth.

The roots of poverty in India run the deepest among the members of scheduled castes and tribes in the country's rural areas. In 2005, these groups accounted for 80 per cent of poor rural people, although their share in the total rural population is much smaller.

HWF's Vision 2026 plan addresses the root causes of poverty through long-term solutions and believes in promoting sustainable livelihoods. A sustainable livelihood is a way of earning a living that empowers people to become self-sufficient and less reliant on humanitarian aid. HWF works hard to empower the rural population through technical training and self employment projects.



VOCATIONAL TRAINING CENTRES

HWF establishes Vocational Training Centres to provide short-time job-oriented courses. These courses are formulated to make the youth capable of getting job opportunities at various fields. HWF offers courses such as Auxiliary Nursing Midwifery (ANM), Computer Training and Tailoring Training at various Vocational Training Centres. During 2017-2018, VTC Jamiatul Falah and Gulaoti Computer Centre got affiliation from MTSTS (A Government approved body).

TRAINING PROGRAM

 Human Welfare Foundation organized a training program on Karchob (Lucknawi Hand Embroidery) at Milakh Pallupura, Moradabad, Uttar Pradesh. 45 women have participated in this one month training. HWF General Secretary Mr. T. Arifali distributed certificates to 40 participants.



- HWF organized a Training
 Workshop on Modern Agricultural Techniques for farmers at Jamtara, Jharkhand.
 The sessions provided information regarding increasing crop production and introduction of new techniques in the field of agriculture.
- HWF organized Tailoring Training Programs at Bamrauli in Uttar Pradesh and Srigram Village in Assam. 55 women attended these training programs.





WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

With two-thirds of the world's illiterate population female and countless girl children not receiving a basic education, supporting women in developing countries is vital to helping overcome critical social issues such as poverty and unemployment.

By empowering women and giving them access to opportunities in the fields of education, employment and health care, the whole society will get benefits. While supporting women to achieve new heights, we can control cycle of poverty and infant mortality rate. Educating female child would ensure more equitable tomorrow.

In India, women are born into a society that is still having to face social inequalities. Through our initiatives, we aim to assist in gender empowerment through various educational, healthcare and income initiatives and empower local women by educating them on their rights the opportunities available to them.

One of the key goals of the Human Welfare Foundation is to empower women from poor and marginalised section of the society. Almost 50 per cent of the beneficiaries of the HWF activities are women. Around half of the scholarship fund goes to female students. We also organise different programmes such as counseling of adolescent girls, socio-legal awareness and skill development programmes for women.



GUIDANCE AND COUNSELING PROGRAM

Human Welfare Foundation and Women Manifesto jointly organized Guidance and Counseling programs for girls through schools and community centres. School based programs give a platform to cover the adolescent girls, whereas community level programs focus to cover non-school going girls, their parents and other stakeholders. Programs consist of sessions on different topics as career guidance, personality



development, stress and Time management techniques, social and legal Awareness. During this period both organizations jointly organized guidance and counseling programs at 11 places. Around 400 girls and women were attended the programs.

SOCIO-LEGAL AWARENESS PROGRAM

Human Welfare Foundation in association with Women's Manifesto organized Socio-Legal Awareness Programs for Women at five places. A total number of 215 women have participated in this program.



HEALTH AWARENESS PROGRAM

Human Welfare Foundation and Women Manifesto jointly organized Health Awareness Programs at four places across Delhi. Around 143 girls and women have attended the program.



SKILL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Under the Skill Development Program, HWF organized two workshops on Hand Embroidery for women at Om Nagar, New Delhi. A total number of 40 women have participated and got training for skill development.





CIVIL RIGHTS PROTECTION

In its report on human rights in India during 2010, Human Rights Watch stated India had "significant human rights problems". They identified lack of accountability for security forces and impunity for abusive policing including "police brutality, extrajudicial killings, and torture" as major problems.

Along with advocates, social activists and grassroots para-legal social workers dedicated to using the legal system to protect and advance the civil and human rights in India, HWF tries to address these problems in order to alleviate the sufferings of the victims of police brutality. During the past years, we have been working to defend the rights of the underprivileged sections of the society and to provide legal aid assistance, protection and rehabilitation to the survivors of intolerance and all sorts of discrimination and oppression.

Following are some of our very basic but important interventions:

- Workshops for Para-Legal Workers and Human Rights Defenders
- Awareness Campaigns on Civil Rights issues
- Helping Citizens get ration card and similar services, which become difficult for a poor person due to lack of knowledge about the process of getting one.
- Helping retired government employee in getting their pensions.
- Helping people in benefiting from the government aid schemes.



RESPONDING TO EMERGENCIES

HWF believes in the rights of all individuals to receive aid in an emergency, based on need. However, women and children face disproportionate risks in emergencies, such as forcible displacement and human rights violations, so emergency responses often are planned to meet their immediate needs. Our disaster management activities are coordinated under the banner of Society for Bright Future (SBF).

Society for Bright Future (SBF), a national level disaster management organisation, was formed as part of Vision 2016 program. SBF specializes in Emergency Relief and Rehabilitation and has quickly responded to all natural and man-made disasters in recent past.

The Emergency and Relief program of SBF includes providing survival items like food, water, clothes, shelter and medical care during emergencies. Also involves training in preparing for and coping with disasters. The Rehabilitation program includes the handicapped assistance program, reconstruction of residential and commercial properties of the affected population and employment assistance, etc.

SBF's main activities include:

- Awareness Creation
- · Training and development of volunteers
- · Relief and Rehabilitation



NATIONAL ADVANCED TRAINING WORKSHOP

SBF organized a Five-day National Advanced Training Workshop on Disaster Management and Adventure Techniques from 19th to 23rd March, 2018 in Nagpur, Maharashtra. 50 volunteers from 11 states were participated.




NATIONAL TRAINING WORKSHOP

SBF organized a National Training Workshop for its State Conveners/Asst. Conveners at SBF Headquarters, New Delhi. 15 state conveners were attended the program.



TRAINING OF VOLUNTEERS

SBF provides training to the prospective volunteers in its relief works. Currently SBF has a total number of 993 trained volunteers from 13 states of India.

FLOOD RELIEF & REHABILITATION

SBF conducted Relief and Rescue work in 15 flood-affected districts of Assam, Bihar and West Bengal and rescued more than 800 families during the hazardous flood in July-August 2017. SBF cooperated with the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) and the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF) in rescuing helpless people. The team has distributed more than 2500 food and organized a medical camp with partner organizations in Araria, Bihar. Around 50 SBF volunteers were engaged in these rehabilitation activities for 2 months.







HOUSING PROJECT IN ASSAM SOUTH

Housing Project under Flood Rehabilitation Work of SBF has been completed in Hailakandi, Assam South for the 2016 floodaffected people of Assam. During the last session, SBF volunteers prepared a project to construct 10 houses for 10 dispossessed families and they have accomplished the same successfully.



EMERGENCY RELIEF

Utkal Express Accident

Puri-Haridwar Utkal Express met with an accident in Muzaffarnagar, Uttar Pradesh on 20th August 2017, in which around 25 people were killed and more than 250 injured. SBF 6 members volunteers' team from Uttar Pradesh (West) reached to the accident spot and later visited the hospitals and arranged necessary facilities to the injured people.





Ration Distribution for Fire Victims

SBF distributed 30 food kits (ration) to the fire victims of Bawana area, Delhi after conducting a detailed survey of the fire-affected people.



Survey Work at Slum Areas




